What is significant?

A gold rush landscape containing shallow shafts/heaps and areas where the alluvial deposits have been stripped to bedrock. The latter associated with the operation of puddling machines.

How is it significant?

The site is significance because of it has:

Intactness: retains evidence of the key aspects of gold rush mining - alluvial shafts and surfaced ground.

Condition: retains fabric in a condition that can be understood and interpreted

Why is it significant?

The site has local significance as a relic of Victoria's gold rush

Interpretation of Site

A gold rush landscape that was first worked by shafts and then by puddling machines. Evidence of both phases are still evident in the form of alluvial diggings and ground stripped

to bedrock. Public land available for recreational fossicking.
