

## **Physical Description 1**

#### Church

The church is of a simple early English Gothic composition with five imposing lancet light windows to the west elevation. Simple stepped bluestone buttresses separate paired lancet windows on the side elevation. Basalt coping stones, supported, on corbel blocks define the steep gable roof, and are terminated by simple crosses.

The effect of this church is drastically altered by the new porch, which destroys the proportion of the west elevation. There was originally a simple entrance portico. However this building provides a contributory streetscape component, and appears to be in good condition.

#### **Church Hall**

This simple double gabled brick hall was constructed in 1868. It is a simple early English Gothic structure with paired lancet windows with hood moulds and simple stepped buttresses. The stone dressings have been painted. The hall is in good condition with an intact slate roof (the finials have been removed) and unpainted brickwork. An early photo of c.1920 shows the hall with a picket fence; more appropriate than the present metal railing fence.
