Interpretation of Site

Dead Dog Bay (the bay at top of The Strand), was a popular eeling location with local residents. It was called dead dog bay as locals used this area to "discard" (drown) unwanted pets here, and hence resulted in an abundance of eels in the area to feed on the carcases (Leak, pers comms). Locals would make "cubbyholes" in the seawall (at the top of the bay under where the ash pits retaining walls are) for shelter from the elements when eeling. There are still holes in the seawall in this area, which could correspond to this report. The site is of archaeological significance for the potential to provide evidence relating to the use of the area and activities associated with possible local eeling. The site has social significance as a place of recreational food gathering.
