## Statement of Significance

Last updated on -

"Ohiho" at no. 43 Hunt Crescent, Ascot Vale West, was built in 1928 for the builder, Stephen Pane. It is aesthetically important as an unusually substantial and prominent inter war villa in the area taking advantage of its elevated situation and recalling the earnest phase in the development of the immediate environs (Criterion A).

## Physical Description 1

A relatively plain red brick inter-war villa with hipped tiled roof, south facing bay window supported on ornamental wrought iron brackets and a large front balcony with horizontal roof carried on fluted cement pillars giving access to the front doors. There are unusual curved iron angles forming a verandah in front of the balcony and carried under the balcony floor.

The garden rockery is laid out with cement paths, a well, and there are curious metal framed seats with signs in perforated metal bars reading. "This is the place for a sity" and "Use but don't abuse". The footpath is bordered by a low railfng almost certainly salvaged from an earlier structure and there are cypress pines and cacti suggestive of an early date.
