What is significant?

The house, constructed c.1897, at 17 Stawell Street, Cranbourne.

How is it significant?

The house at 17 Stawell Street, Cranbourne is of local historic and aesthetic significance to the City of Casey.

Why is it significant?

Historically, it is significant as one of a small number of surviving late nineteenth century houses that demonstrate the development of Cranbourne after the opening of the Railway in 1888. It also has associations with the locally known Cockerill family. (AHC criteria A4, D2 & H1)

Aesthetically, it is significant as a representative example of a simple Victorian weatherboard cottage, which has a relatively high degree of external integrity. (AHC criterion E1)

Physical Description 1

The house at 17 Stawell Street, Cranbourne is a Victorian double-fronted weatherboard cottage. It has a hipped corrugated iron main roof and a rear skillion. The modest front door has highlights and is flanked by double hung sash windows. The convex front verandah is supported on chamfered posts. There are two brick chimneys.

Physical Conditions

The house at 17 Stawell Street, Cranbourne is in fair condition.

Intactness

The house at 17 Stawell Street, Cranbourne has a high degree of external integrity.
