Statement of significance

This vessel is significant historically for its participation in the inter-colonial trades around Australia in the early stages of Australian settlement.

VHR history

Betweeen 1841 - 1845 Agenoria traded between Hobart and Port Albert under the command of Captain G. Bentley. Cargoes from Hobart were composed of ballast, sundries and building materials. Cargoes from Port Albert were made up entirely of passengers, cattle and sheep. At the time when the vessel ran aground on the bar at Port Albert the vessels was transporting sundries. The vessel became a complete wreck and the cargo was entirely lost, but all hands saved. The vessel was insured but the cargo was not.
